

- Who organises it? Living Planet Travel, a company that promotes ecological holidays. They do lots of historical tours, chauffeur-driven excursions and walking holidays.

Living Planet offers one-and two-day trips around some of England's most historic sites (Stonehenge, Avebury, Glastonbury and others). Travelling by Land Rover, you get a guided tour of the area, and there's some gentle off-roading as well. It would make a great family day out.
